# AREA GARDEN CLUBS COMPLETE MAJOR BEAUTIFICATION PROJECT AT PROSPECT HILL By Rudy Becker Prospect Hill Trustee

As reported in the last newsletter, District 1 of the National Capital Area Garden Clubs, Inc. (NCAGC) and Prospect Hill Cemetery joined forces to install a Memorial Grove at the northern boundary of the cemetery. The work had been scheduled and completed last month and it looks great.

During an early site inspection it was noted that a water line likely ran through the proposed Memorial Grove. Investigation with the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority (DCWASA) revealed that the cemetery had given DCWASA an easement to install a 12-inch water main through the cemetery from Lincoln Road to North Capital Street. The main had been installed in 1896 and is still in active service. Needless to say, locating the main became of paramount importance in determining the positions of the new horticulture. Working with the Director of Water Services, Curtis Cochrane, the line was eventually marked.

The landscape plan was developed by Jan Townshend, program manager of the Neighborhood Design Center, Inc. The horticulture (trees, plants, bushes) was purchased from Shemin Landscape Supply Company, located in Burtonsville, MD. Charmane Truesdell was the project manager for NCAGC. As she worked closely with all parties involved, her professionalism and quiet confidence was instrumental in insuring a successful project.

On Thursday, September 17, the horticultural items were delivered. Fearing that the planting work would exceed the capabilities of the volunteers, Ms. Truesdell had arranged for F & F Landscape Company, of

# CEMETERY GATES WILL BE OPEN THE HOLIDAY WEEKENDS

With Christmas and New Year's falling on a Friday, the cemetery gates will be open the usual times, 10 am to 4 pm, the entire weekends. Gates ordinarily are open Thursday through Monday but closed on Tuesday and Wednesday. They will also be open on Thanksgiving day.

Brandywine, MD to deliver and plant the horticulture. The firm arrived with the horticulture, mulch, soil amendments and a crew of six at about 10:00 am and by 12:30 pm, the work was complete.

On Saturday, September 19, at 10:00 am, volunteers from NCAGC, Prospect Hill Cemetery and the Washington Saengerbund arrived to complete the project. The volunteers distributed and spread mulch around all the new plants as well as the existing azaleas, that formed the old Memorial Garden, donated by cemetery lot owners over the previous two years.

The landscaping plan has as its final touch the placement of a stone angel which had been knocked off a monument by a large tree felled during a windstorm several years ago. The cemetery will undertake to install a foundation to support the weighty angel in the near future.

# TOTENSONNTAG SERVICE HELD AT PROSPECT HILL IN SPITE OF THE WEATHER FORECAST

The weather forecast for Sunday, November 1, 2009, was downright forbidding the Friday before and the trustees wondered whether our annual Totensonntag service should be canceled. But by Saturday morning, the forecast had improved considerably to clear and sunny, but a little cool, and it was decided to hold the service as planned. However, by early Sunday morning, things took a turn for the worse, with rain in the morning and early afternoon and clearing forecast not to occur until well after the service would be over. After consulting with all involved, the trustees decided to take our chances with the weather and proceed with the event.

As members of the Washington Saengerbund choral group began to arrive just after noon on Sunday, a light, but steady rain fell. Discussions were held with its conductor, David Montgomery, about where they would sing if the rain did not stop. The best location was in the cemetery office, as the noise of North Capitol Street traffic would have drowned them out on the front porch.

As the choir warmed up in the office, the sky over the cemetery became noticeably brighter and the sun broke through just in time, at about 1:30 PM.

Prospect Hill Board of Trustees President Carol Holler opened the service at 2:00 PM and welcomed the all present. She enjoined them to think of and honor such well-known people as August Gottlieb Schoenborn, designer of the iron structure supporting the US Capitol dome, Julius Viedt, founder of the Washington Saengerbund, and Friedrich Imhof, founder of the German Orphanage, Concluding her remarks, she introduced Trustee Rudy Becker as master of ceremonies.

Rudy introduced Pastor Bodo Schwabe of The United Church – Die Vereinigte Kirche. Pastor Schwabe led the attendees in the opening prayer.

The Saengerbund offered their first song, Morgengebet (Morning Prayer) by Felix Mendelssohn.

Rudy thanked all who came out for the service despite the foreboding weather forecast. He noted that we had three things to be grateful for on that day.

- The first was the sacrifice of German-Americans who fought for Washington, DC during the Civil War, and he read an article written on the subject by cemetery historian Jean Crabill.
- The second was the generosity of member garden clubs of the National Capital Area Garden Clubs (NCAGC) in donating materials and labor for the new Memorial Grove. Along with volunteers from the cemetery Board of Trustees and the Washington Saengerbund, over 30 plants, shrubs and trees had been planted. He recognized Carol Holler for coming up with the idea for a horticultural screen along the northern boundary and Christine Hambach of the Goddard Garden Club for shepherding the project thru the NCAGC approval process.
- The third thing to be grateful for was the attendance of Mr. Elmar Kohlhofer of the Cultural Department of the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany.

Preceded by the singing of Grablied (Grave Song), composed by Carl Maria von Weber, and sung by the Washington Saengerbund, Pastor Schwabe offered his message for the day, that we have one thing in

common and that is that we will all die one day, but should not be afraid, because a great reward has been planned for us.

Following Franz Schubert's Wanderer's Nactlied (Wanderer's Night Song) sung by the Washington Saengerbund, Pastor Schwabe offered his blessing, and the service was concluded.

All participants and attendees were treated to a fine reception prepared and served by trustee Edith Gill and her husband John, in the cemetery office.

Special thanks are due the members of the Washington Saengerbund, their conductor David Montgomery, Pastor Bodo Schwabe of The United Church and the trustees of Prospect Hill for their efforts with another memorable and successful memorial service.
